HOW MUCH DOES CAMP COST?

There is no cost to camper or family. There is no obligation to the family.

WHERE WILL THE CAMPERS EAT AND SLEEP?

Separate boys and girls cabins will provide a safe and fun environment for the campers. Up to five children and three adult counselors will be in each cabin.

In good weather, meals are provided by the camp kitchen and prepared by counselors and campers at their campsite. When it rains, meals are eaten in the Pavillion.

WHAT DO WE DO AT CAMP?

Make new friends... fishing, boating, games (gaga pit, nine-square-in-theair, basketball), crafts...make new friends... swimming, choose new books, star-gazing, campfires, archery, water trampoline, make new friends...

Our only mission is for each camper to have an experience of being unconditionally loved and accepted as they are. We believe that this is the way that God loves us, and that it is best shown by the way we care for and treat each other.

WHAT IS CAMP LIKE?



What it's all about

Our <u>mission</u> is to share *agape*. The word *agape* is a Greek word. It means the kind of love God has for everyone of us — free, unconditional, no-strings attached. We don't have to - in fact, we can't - earn that love. It's already here for <u>every one</u> of us. All we have to do is to open our hands, our minds, our hearts to that love and receive it. Our <u>purpose</u> is to provide a <u>free</u> week of camping for children who have had a parent or caregiver under the supervision of the Department of Corrections.

Our <u>goal</u> is to help campers discover deep within themselves their strength and core of goodness.

Children may participate whether or not they have any religious affiliation. At Camp Agape, we do not require campers to participate in religious activities.

<u>Camp Agape</u> offered its first camp in August, 2006 for 28 children. Since then, we have offered a week of camp each summer. Vermont children with a parent in prison have enjoyed over 530 free weeks of camp through Camp Agape. Since 2010, we have offered Older Kid camps for children that have attended our 8-11year old program. Some former campers have gone on to be Counselors-In-Training.
